





SCYLLA AND CHARYBDIS

Noted in Homer's *Odyssey*, Scylla and Charybdis were sea monsters in the forms of a half-maiden, half-snake-necked-dog-headed creature, and vast whirlpool, respectively. Both resided on opposite sides of the Strait of Messina, but were close enough that sailors had to pass one or the other and choose which monster to brave when seeking passage. According to Homer, Odysseus made this decision with the logic that he would lose much of his crew to Scylla, but would lose the entirety of his ship to Charybdis. He decided the former would at least allow him to pass with some ship and crew left and chose the lesser of two evils.

Similar stories involving the navigation of one hazard or another led to the creation of idiomatic sayings such as "incidit in scyllam cupiens vitare charybdis" (he runs on Scylla, wishing to avoid Charybdis) and

"Between a rock and a hard place." Such sayings have become commonplace in everyday English with many native English speakers using them without even realizing the mythical background.

Culturally, the story of Scylla and Charybdis has been referenced in everything from eighteenth century political cartoons to twenty-first century rock songs. Jim Gillray's Britannia between Scylla and Charybdis (3 June 1793) depicts William

Pitt at the helm of the ship Constitution carrying a visibly alarmed Britannia. The ship comes between a rock with the liberty cap on top, representing democracy, and a whirlpool in the shape of an inverted crown, serving as representation of arbitrary power. The cartoon was drawn to illustrate the effects of the French Revolution on British politics. Even in the last few centuries, the myth of Scylla and Charybdis continues to be used to relate important issues to the public. The choice between two evils continues to be a common theme in people's everyday lives even today. ■





